Inspired by a wet and cool public holiday and a flourishing landscape.

We are really seeing the benefit of the regeneration project and the landscape is alive with colour.

We have come up with a good design bones, showing portraits of Margaret and Albert Morrison, the line of load (mining), the barrier ranges and the fence line between the regeneration area and the Desert.

We will try and access Margaret Morris's works in the public archives and use them somehow. And then details of the amazing flowers that are filling the countryside. The textured landscape is screaming embroidery at the moment.

We are planning to take a couple more photos and look at a couple of monuments for inspiring words etc and draw up our final design.

I very much hope that one of the first activities Margaret and I will undertake together is a trip to Broken Hill. I can't wait!
